

Decision and Reasons

The Complainant and the Respondent Officer were previously known to each other and, at the time of this incident, were engaged in civil litigation. On November 1, 2024, the Complainant and Respondent Officer, while off-duty, were both at a local community centre with their children. The Complainant, who perceived that the Respondent Officer was repeatedly glancing in the direction of their daughter, approached the Officer, initiated a heated argument in which the Officer remained calm. This interaction was corroborated by two witnesses. Subsequent to this incident, out of concern for their safety and that of their family, the Officer reported the incident to the police service of jurisdiction, which was not the service and the Complainant was cautioned about their behaviour. The Professional Standards Unit investigation concluded the Officer acted in accordance with the sexpectations associated to professionalism. The allegation the Respondent Officer was uncivil to the Complainant by yelling at them and filing a false police report, was unsubstantiated.

In the course of this altercation, the Complaint also alleged the Respondent Officer disclosed their personal health information. Further, the Officer was privy to this information as part of their ongoing civil litigation. The Officer denied doing so and their account was corroborated by two witness. The allegation the Respondent Officer released medical information was unsubstantiated.
